Mary Katherine Morn, President and Lead Executive Officer of UUSC since 2018, brings 30 years of faith-based leadership, fostering progressive congregations and championing economic, racial, and social justice. Her extensive work includes collaborations with interfaith and advocacy organizations on issues such as homelessness, reproductive justice, and LGBTQI+ rights. She has also held leadership roles with the UU Ministers' Association and the Unitarian Universalist Association.
