Panza, now doing business as New Horizons Communities, provides permanent supportive housing for people experiencing homelessness. They create and manage tiny home villages that foster community, encourage personal growth, and promote access to the care and services residents need. Founded with OUUC leadership in 2007 to support a tent camp for homeless adults hosted by local churches, Panza created Quixote Village, a permanent supportive community for the homeless in Olympia. Now, as New Horizon Communities, this nonprofit has built two additional villages, especially for veterans, in other communities.
